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TRUSTEE REPORT, JUNE 2016

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

TDSB Operating Budget for 2016-17

The Board approved a balanced operating budget for the 2016-2017 year. TDSB has an annual operating budget of \$3.1 billion. Projected deficit for 2016-17 is approximately \$21M. The approved balanced budget plan includes a number of central department reductions (totaling \$15.2M) for 2016-17. An additional \$5.8M will need to be found in-year to fully balance the budget. Staff will continue to review operational expenditures to look for efficiencies. It should be noted that no additional costs are associated with the creation of the Learning Centres. The Board will approve the Capital Budget when it approves the Long-Term Program and Accommodations Strategy and Annual Plan at its June Meeting.

TDSB continues working towards reorganizing the wards into four Learning Centres. Our network of schools in Ward 20, Scarborough-Agincourt will be working with three wonderful and experienced Superintendents of Education in Learning Centre 2 - Louie Papathanaskis, Lynn Strangway and Beth Veale.

With fewer schools, the Superintendents will have the ability to get to know their communities and be more responsive to them. Developing and maintaining good communications and supportive relationships among parents, principals, staff and trustees is an essential part of their role. We will plan for opportunities to meet our new Superintendents during the first Ward Meeting in the 2016-17 school year. New Gifted program Screening Process

Currently children can be put forward for gifted level IQ testing at the request of a parent or teacher, but there is no universal screener. Starting this fall, **all** Grade 3 children will be given the Canadian Cognitive Abilities Test (CCAT). If all criteria are met and parents are in agreement, a child can be put forward to an IPRC committee for a potential gifted designation and the opportunity to learn in a congregated program adapted to giftedness exceptionality.

Changes to Immunization Program

According to a new government fact sheet, "Beginning in the 2016-17 school year, Ontario will offer the HPV vaccine free of charge to all boys and girls in Grade 7. If you have a daughter entering Grade 8 in the 2016-17 school year, she will also be offered the vaccine through school-based clinics." The Fact Sheet can be found at www.ontario.ca/hpv.

There are also other amendments being proposed to the *Immunization of School Pupils Act* (ISPA). They include parents needing to attend an education session delivered by a medical officer of health should they wish to exempt children from immunization. And the other is the streamlining of the reporting process by having health care providers report immunization records to local public health units. These Amendments are working their way through the Legislative process.

2016-2017 SuperCouncil and Student Trustee Elections

We would like to officially welcome our two newly-elected Student Trustees – Shams Mehdi from Leaside High School and Saad Wazir from SATEC @ W.A. Porter Collegiate Institute. Shams and Saad were elected along with SuperCouncil Executives on May 13, 2016. As a result of the work of outgoing Student Trustees Sammy Al Rubaie and Hamima Fattah, Shams will be the first Student Trustee to serve a two-year term.

School Traffic Safety in the City of Toronto

Below is an excellent infographic in support of TDSB's Charter for Active Transportation. It's based on research from York University and the Hospital for Sick Children. There isn't a week that goes by that I don't get an e-mail from either a school or community member worried about traffic around our schools. Many of the complaints are about illegal parking! The messages are clear - walking to school does not increase child pedestrian accidents if the built environment is safe. Built environment modifications reduce unsafe driver and pedestrian behaviours leading to a reduction in collisions. Schools with crossing guards have 14% more students walking to school. And interestingly, the installation of speed bumps was associated with a 45% decrease in collision rates in children.
