Information about the success of our programs comes from a wide variety of student assessments. These assessments are based on clear expectations for all learners, consistent with those described in *The Ontario Curriculum*.

The primary purpose of student assessment is to improve learning. Assessment has the greatest potential to improve learning when it is an integral part of classroom activities. Teachers assess student progress towards achieving the expectations on an ongoing basis by using strategies such as projects, class presentations, homework assignments, classroom observations, portfolios of student work, and tests.

Schools use assessment information and information from other sources to make informed decisions for school improvement planning. Schools identify areas of strength as well as areas that require improvement. Input is obtained from a variety of sources such as student assessments, teacher feedback, parent feedback, and community surveys. In this way, schools monitor, celebrate and improve their efforts in providing a supportive and challenging learning environment for all their students.

## WHAT OUR SCHOOL IS PLANNING FOR THIS YEAR

Our school is working on improving our students' assessment results for reading, writing and mathematics. We will implement the following strategies:

### Curriculum

- ♦ use early literacy programs such as Letterland (Kindergarten), Take-A-Book-Home, a primary reading support program and reading buddies (all grades)
- ♦ provide balanced literacy programs
- ♦ continue using literacy blocks of time in our daily classroom timetables
- ♦ increase the use of manipulatives in the classroom to support the mathematics program
- ♦ teach all mathematics strands with more emphasis on problem solving
- ♦ support and encourage greater participation in our music program
- ♦ integrate student literacy skills with computer technology
- ♦ use technology where appropriate to enhance learning
- ♦ connect excursions to sites that support the Ontario curriculum

### Assisting Students

- ♦ promote the completion by each student of the agenda and encourage parental signature daily
- ♦ assist students in determining their own learning goals
- ♦ provide remedial support to students as necessary before and after school
- ♦ ensure expanded opportunities for students to develop various skills and address their needs

### Safety

- ♦ update and promote students' learning of our Code of Conduct via classroom lessons, special assemblies, and parent meetings
- ♦ continue to implement the Second Step program focusing on social skills development
- ♦ continue with the Peer Mediation program and

- ♦ provide leadership opportunities for students
- ♦ continue to work with the Safe Schools committee to address safety in the school and community

### Staff Development

- ♦ implement in-school staff development programs to increase awareness of resources and programs available
- ♦ encourage our teachers to attend staff development workshops on literacy, numeracy, student assessment and evaluation
- ♦ maintain mentoring program for staff

In conjunction with our School Council and Home and School Association, we have developed a number of plans to be implemented over the next three years. We will continue to:

- ♦ support a welcoming program for Kindergarten parents, guardians, grandparents, and caregivers
- ♦ initiate and create a parent handbook
- ♦ increase the use of parent and community volunteers in our school
- ♦ support and encourage community involvement
- ♦ provide opportunities for students to help enhance school spirit
- ♦ support the use of Student Agendas for Gr. 1- 8

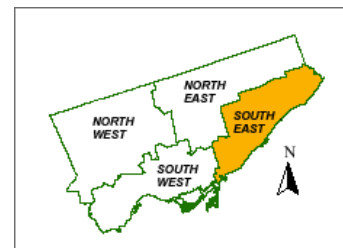
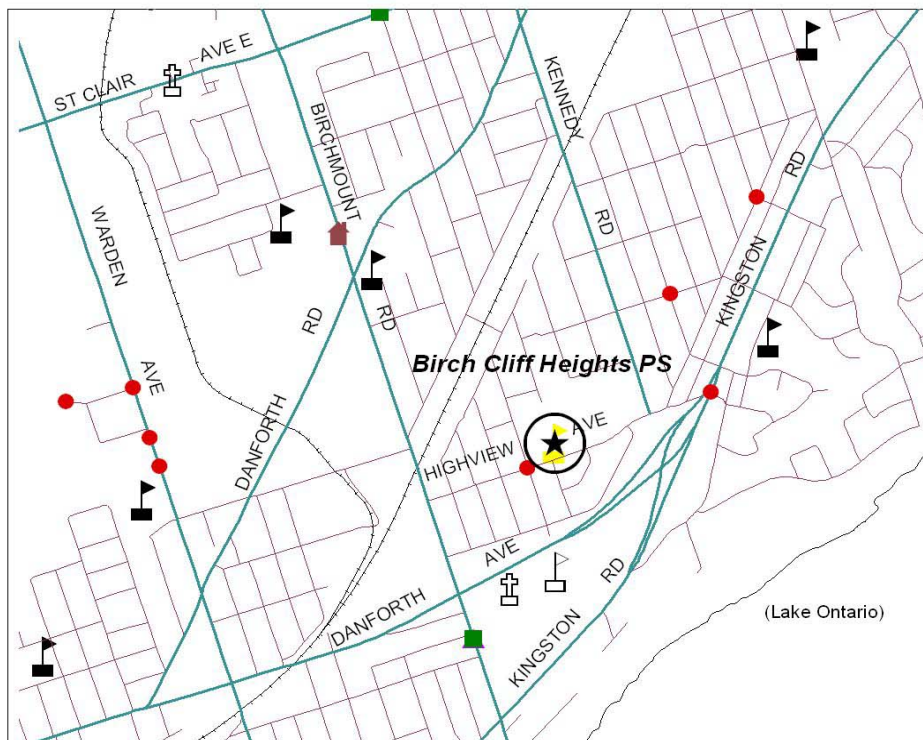
