Blantyre Public School first opened in 1928. Sixty-five years later, the original building was replaced by our state-of-the-art facility serving Kindergarten to Gr. 8 students. The size of the school has stabilized at approximately 250 students.

The building houses Today's Child Tomorrow's Future Children's Centre, providing day care for children from 2-10 years.

The staff members at Blantyre Public School are committed to providing for our pupils a student-centred curriculum that will fulfil the personal, social and intellectual requirements necessary to meet the challenges of today and in the future. We value the traditions of the past, but are continually searching for new and innovative ideas that will put our students first.

Information about the success of our programs comes from a wide variety of student assessments. These assessments are based on clear expectations for all learners, consistent with those described in *The Ontario Curriculum*.

The primary purpose of student assessment is to improve learning. Assessment has the greatest potential to improve learning when it is an integral part of classroom activities. Teachers assess student progress towards achieving the expectations on an ongoing basis by using strategies such as projects, class presentations, homework assignments, classroom observations, portfolios of student work, and tests.

Schools use assessment information and information from other sources to make informed decisions for school improvement planning. Schools identify areas of strength as well as areas that require improvement. Input is obtained from a variety of sources such as student assessments, teacher feedback, parent feedback, and community surveys. In this way, schools monitor, celebrate and improve their efforts in providing a supportive and challenging learning environment for all their students.

WHAT OUR SCHOOL IS PLANNING FOR THIS YEAR

Blantyre P.S. is implementing the Ontario curriculum in the following areas: Kindergarten, Language, Mathematics, Science and Technology, Social Studies, The Arts, Physical and Health Education and French (Grade 4-8).

Literacy and Numeracy

- ✦ maintain literacy and numeracy as curriculum priorities
- ✦ integrate library and related skills into the curriculum
- ✦ stress the teaching of reading strategies such as: guided reading cloze procedures, shared reading, book clubs and reading buddies
- ✦ continue to enhance training of teachers in assesment and evaluation
- ✦ extend the hours of the library resource centre through the partnership of parent volunteers
- ✦ maximize the role of volunteers in assisting students to read and to write
- ✦ increase the use of manipulatives in the mathematics programs.
- ✦ improve basic computational skills in all grades
- ✦ expand Language Assessment in the Junior/Intermediate Grades (CASI)

Information Technology

- ✦ teach information technology across the curriculum with a focus on numeracy and literacy
- ✦ expand the reading buddies program to reading/computer buddies
- ✦ timetable all classes, Kindergarten to Grade 8 through the computer lab
- ✦ continue and foster partnerships with the community, business and other schools
- ✦ develop a school web site
- ✦ provide additional computers in each classroom
- ✦ continue use of servers to provide individual student and staff files

Personal and Social Responsibility

- ✦ implement TDSB "Let's Stop the Bullying" program - Kto8

- ✦ expand students' sense of social responsibility to self, school and community
- ✦ seize opportunities to engage in Magic Circle and other conflict resolution strategies
- ✦ provide opportunities for students to exercise leadership skills, i.e., student parliament, student announcements, peer tutoring, peer mediation
- ✦ interact with the School Council to review and revise school policies such as homework, code of behaviour, lateness, and lunchroom expectations, volunteer handbook

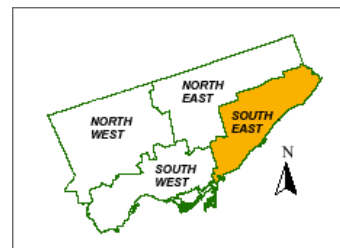
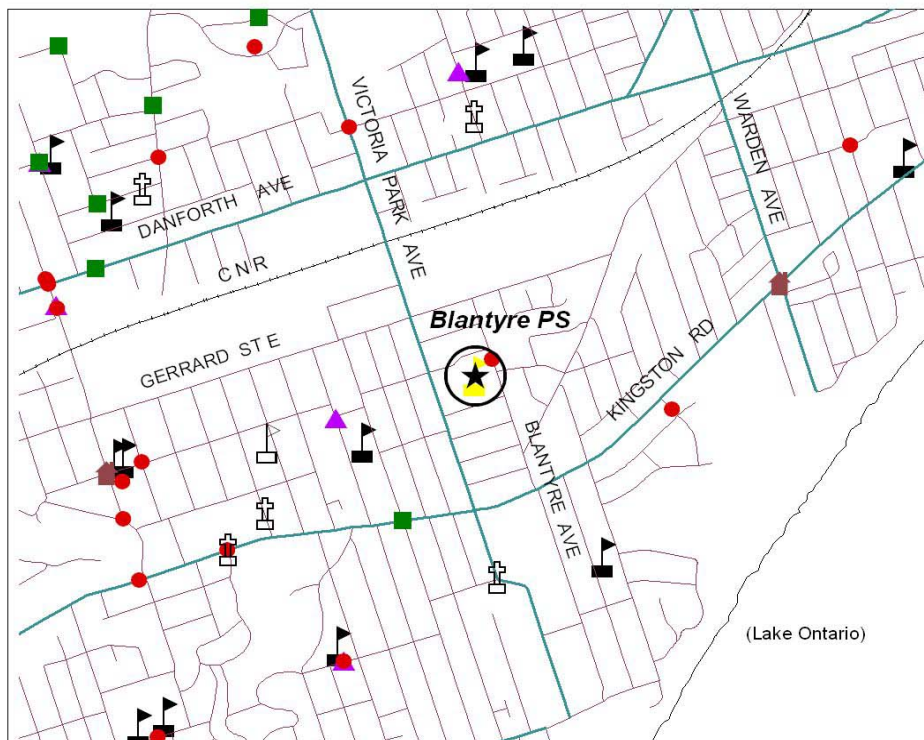
Parent Involvement:
