OUR SCHOOL

Indian Road Crescent Junior School is located in the Junction Area of Toronto, east of Annette and Keele Streets. The original school, located to the north of the current building, was built in 1901. It was originally called Western Avenue Public School and was built on one of the transportation routes used by our native peoples. The new school was built in 1964. Indian Road Crescent serves students from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 6.

- ✦ The school population is approximately 300. Our population is quite diverse; over one third of our students speak languages other than English.
- ✦ The Bloorview MacMillan Crescent Nursery, an integrated pre-school, shares space with Indian Road Crescent.
- ✦ Parenting and Family Literacy Centre located in the school offers parenting courses and literacy support for parents. The Parenting and Family Literacy Centre at Indian Road Crescent is the most used Centre across the TDSB.

School Focus For This School Year

- ✦ We are no longer an Early Years Literacy Project school, however we continue to focus on literacy initiatives across the grades. Our specific goal for this year is: To improve literacy achievement of all students, particularly in the areas of reading and inferencing skills.
- ✦ Continue to implement the First Steps Writing practices and assessment
- ✦ Junior division focus on the CASI reading assessment program and the implementation of Guided Reading
- ✦ Primary division focus on DRA reading assessment
- ✦ Identifying the bottom 15% at risk learners in the school and providing support for their success through monthly team meetings
- ✦ Continue to implement the Second Steps Violence Prevention and Future Aces Program
- ✦ Integrating Developmentally Handicapped and identified students into regular programs where applicable
- ✦ Review of our school safety plans and safe schools initiatives
- ✦ Continue to celebrate and acknowledge our cultural diversity
- ✦ Staff continue to share best teaching practices through our in-school staff development initiatives

Information about the success of our programs comes from a wide variety of student assessments. These assessments are based on clear expectations for all learners, consistent with those described in *The Ontario Curriculum*.

The primary purpose of student assessment is to improve learning. Assessment has the greatest potential to improve learning when it is an integral part of classroom activities. Teachers assess student progress towards achieving the expectations on an ongoing basis by using strategies such as projects, class presentations, homework assignments, classroom observations, portfolios of student work, and tests.

Schools use assessment information and information from other sources to make informed decisions for school improvement planning. Schools identify areas of strength as well as areas that require improvement. Input is obtained from a variety of sources such as student assessments, teacher feedback, parent feedback, and community surveys. In this way, schools monitor, celebrate and improve their efforts in providing a supportive and challenging learning environment for all their students.

WHAT OUR SCHOOL IS PLANNING FOR THIS YEAR

LITERACY INSTRUCTION

Reading

- ✦ Use the Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA) on each student in Primary Division and CASI in the Junior Division twice a year
- ✦ Use classroom data walls to track student progress and assist staff in programming
- ✦ Teachers take part in Professional Learning Communities as Indian Road is an OFIP 3 (Ontario Focussed Intervention Partnership) school, focussing on improving Literacy achievement in all grades.
- ✦ Participate in workshops with other SW2 schools
- ✦ Continue to follow The Ontario Curriculum
- ✦ Continue Reading Buddies
- ✦ Continue to expose children to a wide selection of reading materials
- ✦ Acquire more levelled books to enrich both Borrow-a-Book and classroom programs

- ✦ Implement classroom instructional strategies that facilitate the development of language conventions (e.g., phonics, grammar, punctuation)
- ✦ English as a Second Language (ESL) support

Writing

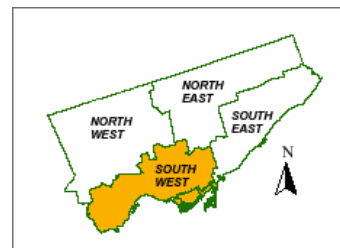
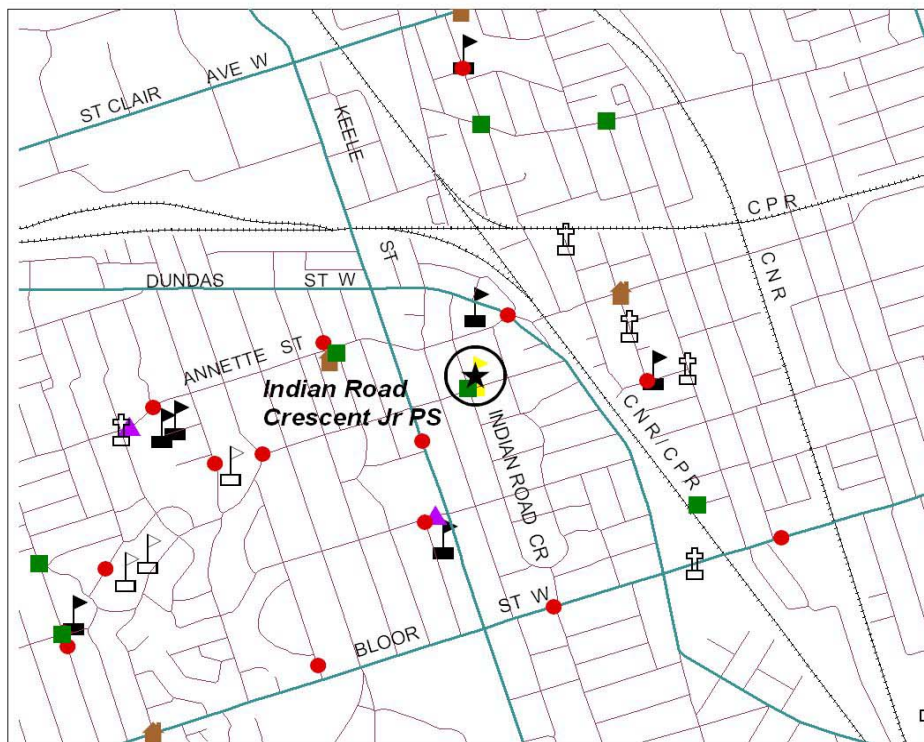
Parent Involvement:
