Strategic Directions

1. Build Strong Relationships and Partnerships Within School Communities to Support Student Learning and Well-Being

Recommendation

It is recommended that the following be approved:

- 1. That \$1,051,744.54 be received from the City of Toronto to fund the costs associated with fencing upgrades at Church Street Junior Public School.
- That the Director be authorized to enter into a Community Access Agreement with the City of Toronto on terms and conditions and in a form and content satisfactory to the Toronto District School Board's General Counsel for a term of twenty years.

Context

Toronto City Council has approved three motions that direct funding to an extensive fencing upgrade at Church Street Junior Public School.

The fencing upgrade has two main components: a new concrete retaining wall with an illuminated (or lit) glass guard and a new marine-grade metal fence.

Appendix A shows illustrations of both the lit glass guard and the metal fence, and Appendix B indicates their locations on the master plan for the site.

Appendix C contains the City Council motion for the lit glass guard, and Appendices D and E show the motions for the metal fence.

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The City of Toronto's total contribution is \$1,051,744.54. The estimated cost breakdown for its portion of the project is shown in Appendix F.

The City's funding has been secured through the use of contributions it has received by way of the application of Sections 37 and 45 of the *Planning Act*.

As outlined in Appendix G, in order to receive Section funding, the Board is required to enter into a Community Access Agreement with the City that speaks to community access requirements and the duration of the TDSB's commitment to uphold community access.

Action Plan and Associated Timeline

The timelines associated with the following milestones are estimates:

- Project tendered: April 2019
- Finalize community use agreement negotiations with the City of Toronto: April/May 2019
- TDSB and City of Toronto sign the agreement: May 2019
- Award contract: May/June 2019
- Construction start date: July 2019
- Date for completion: December 2019

Resource Implications

The Board is contributing \$250,000 towards the project, which is equivalent to the cost of the new concrete retaining wall (that supports the glass guard) and what it would have cost to install new chain link fencing on top of it.

Communications Considerations

School community consultations were held during the design development process, which included a public meeting that reviewed the final scope of the project.






1. Lit Glass Guard and Concrete Retaining Wall



Church Street - West Elevation View - Sidewalk




2. Marine-Grade Metal Fence Detail

a. 355 Church Street secured for local street and/or park improvements in the immediate area of the lot in the amount \$189,687.42 (Source Account: XR3026-3700687)

Appendix G – Sections 37 and 45 of the Planning Act

Section 37 of the Planning Act allows the City to collect funds from a development application in return for additional density. The City policy requires that Section 37 funds be earmarked for community benefits in the host ward of the development application.

The City has prepared general guidelines for staff and the development community to work within. Examples of appropriate use of Section 37 funding include:

- Parks (Park Improvements, Playing Field, Open Space, Playground)
- Roads and Streetscapes (Road and Streetscape Improvements, Parking Area, Traffic Calming, Road Allowance)
- Environment Improvements (Re-naturalization, Trail and Path Improvements, Greening Initiatives)

Section 37 cash contributions from the City of Toronto may also be appropriate towards the capital costs of facilities on school properties or within school buildings.

Section 45 of the *Planning Act* refers to minor variances to bylaws in respect of land, buildings or structures, approved by the City of Toronto Committee of Adjustment. Conditions may be attached to minor variances, which may include financial contributions toward a community project.

The current process to transfer Section 37 and 45 funding from the City of Toronto to the Board is initiated by a Motion at City Council and requires the TDSB to enter into a Community Use Agreement with the City of Toronto that speaks to community access requirements and the duration of the TDSB's commitment to uphold community access.
