Parent/Guardian/Caregiver Webinar Sessions

- On March 5th and March 6th, Special Education and Inclusion offered a parent engagement session for parents/guardians/caregivers. There were a total of 59 attendees.
- Topics covered included transitions for students with an Individual Education Plan (IEP), elementary to secondary transitions, post secondary transitions, school and home partnerships, and key resources for families. The sessions were facilitated by Special Education and Inclusion Centrally Assigned Principals and Coordinators and Consultants. Principal/Vice Principal Drop-In Sessions

- In addition to monthly professional learning at Family of Schools meetings, the Special Education and Inclusion Centrally Assigned Principals (CAPs) have established monthly virtual drop-in sessions for all administrators.
- During these sessions, time is set aside for both structured professional learning and the
 opportunity for administrators to ask specific questions about Special Education topics,
 including writing effective Individual Education Plans (IEPs), addressing safety concerns,
 managing in a unionized environment, and creating support staff timetables. This has built a
 collaborative and supportive community among administrators, allowing them to share best
 practices, discuss challenges, and exchange ideas to enhance their overall effectiveness in
 promoting inclusive education within their schools.



Unleashing Learning 2025

• The TDSB's Multi Year Strategic Plan, framed by the Global Competencies and Deep Learning through Technology, was the focus of the Unleashing Learning 2025 on Tuesday, April 8th, 2025. The Assistive Technology/SEA team presented insightful sessions on assistive technology and communication tools, including Bookcreator, WeVideo, and AAC communication, and how they support students with special education needs. The DLL marketplace also showcased assistive technology tools that the Digital Lead Learners had used in their classrooms throughout the year.



ASD Summer Skills Development Program – Summer 2025 Session

- The Toronto District School Board is offering the summer session of the ASD Skills Development Leisure Program for students entering Grades 4–10 with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). This program, titled *Doing What I Love: At Home, At School, and In the* Community!, provides students with the opportunity to develop, strengthen, and enhance their social skills through engaging leisure activities. The program focuses on social-communication skill development, with an emphasis on leisure and recreational activities tailored to students' interests.

Education Community Partnership Program (ECPP) Summer Program

• The ECPP Program will be providing summer school secondary credit programs for students in partnership with Humber River Hospital, SickKids Hospital, Springboard, Turning Point, Fernie Youth Services, The Jessie and June Calwood Centre, Abiona Centre, Central Toronto Youth Services, Youthdale Treatment Centres and Lumenus Community Services. The ECPP Summer Program provides students the opportunity to earn a credit in the summer while receiving the support they need from the community agency.



Trip to Forest Valley Outdoor Education Center for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Students

On Tuesday, March 4th, 2025, 130 Deaf and Hard of Hearing (D/HH) students from JK to Grade 12, representing 96 schools across the TDSB, took part in a full day of hands-on learning at Forest Valley Outdoor Education Centre. These students, who receive Tier 2 and 3 support from the D/HH Itinerant Team, alongside their itinerant teachers, spent the day learning, connecting, and celebrating their identities as D/HH learners.

Meeting or reconnecting with peers who also use hearing aids, cochlear implants, and remote microphone systems helped foster a strong sense of community and belonging amongst the students. Younger students had the chance to form connections with role models, while older students shared their lived experiences navigating school as D/HH learners in the TDSB.
