Welcome and Introductions	Palmer welcomed everyone to the meeting, and thanked the presenters from Right to Play. Introductions were made around the table.

Model Schools for Inner Cities Update	<p>Central Coordinating Principal Helen Fisher provided the update.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> On October 3rd, six Grade 6 classes from Model Schools for Inner Cities (MSIC) had the opportunity to visit the NASA exhibit at the Metro Convention Centre. Model Schools Teaching and Literacy Coaches have been establishing Teaching Learning Networks (TLN) in their assigned schools. There are three areas of focus this year: Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM), Numeracy, and Early Years learning. 	

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • STEM tool kits: MSIC has purchased tool kits for each K- 8 Model School. These kits contain hands-on tasks that allow students to engage with aspects of STEM. Learning. The MSIC Coaches will support the teachers in learning how to use the kits to get the most from the experiences. • I2Q project: This is a pilot project in innovative thinking. It is running in 11 Model Schools. MSIC has developed curriculum for this project along with Lead Teachers, and Model Schools is collecting feedback from the ongoing pilot. • CAT4 assessments have just completed in Model Schools. Data will be collated, and MSIC will report to schools on student success. This process allows schools to strategize the support for students, and identify marker students for individualized learning support. • Multi-lingual Book Fair: On November 6 and 7, publishers will attend a book fair to promote and sell dual language and culturally relevant books and materials. MSIC partners with the TDSB library system, so that all books purchased at the fair can be catalogued on the spot, and be in circulation right away. There are two sites for the book fair, Parkside PS and Rockcliffe MS. • Vision Clinics: Once again, vision screening clinics will run throughout the year in Model Schools. All students receive a vision screening, and children with vision issues are referred to an optometry office for further examination. They will receive free glasses. • Model Schools is offering Exploration Classrooms. Teachers can visit and observe the class, and then ask questions of teachers, and take new learning and ideas back to their classroom. <p>Q: Who is purchasing at the Multi-Lingual book fair? A: Anyone may attend: Teachers, parents, other TDSB staff.</p> <p>Q: Are books offered at a discounted price? A: No, but publishers offer a lower price than retail sales.</p> <p>Q: If a STEM kit is for whole school, how is its use and sharing determined among teachers?</p>	

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	<p>A: That will be a local school decision. K - 8 schools received two kits. One is elementary, and the second is for intermediate classes. It would be optimal for every class to have the opportunity to use the kit over the school year.</p>	
<p>Presentation: Right to Play</p>	<p>-Matthew Judd and Adam Iggers from Right To Play presented to the group.</p> <p>-RTP is a global organization that uses the power of sport and play as a tool for learning and development. We use inclusive games and play to ask kids to reflect, connect, and apply what they learn..</p> <p>-We have a new program called Concrete Warriors that engages Aboriginal youth, along with a new diabetes awareness program. Youth to Youth is the longest running urban program.</p> <p>-In Canada, we focus on two programs: PLAY and Youth to Youth. We partner with 30 TDSB schools, many of those are Model Schools.</p> <p>PLAY: This program partners with first nations and community organizations in Ontario and Manitoba. The core objective is to use play to build health and cooperation in the community.</p> <p>Youth to Youth(Y2Y): There are 4 components in Y2Y program:</p> <p><i>Leaders in Action.</i> Secondary school student leaders are mentored to run an after-school program at an elementary school. Eg: Runnymede CI and George Syme.</p> <p><i>Recess Play:</i> Eg: George Webster Elementary: RTP trained play leaders and ran recess program with inclusive, safe cooperative games. The student play leaders then assume the leadership role with their school mates.</p> <p><i>Academic Tutoring:</i> This program pairs a high school and elementary school. The teens are trained as tutors/ mentors / leaders.</p> <p><i>Outdoor education:</i> This is a partnership with Evergreen Brickworks and Outward Bound. It rewards our youth leaders with an Outward Bound outdoor experience.</p> <p>Q: In some cases, are you employing local people?.</p> <p>A: In many cases, program success is based on a volunteer or community member.</p>	

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	<p>Q: Are you looking for new schools? Can RTP partner with community organizations?</p> <p>A: There is a new initiative that takes RTP resources into community and youth centers for after-school programs. It expands to include job-readiness skills.</p> <p>-There are many points of commonality between the goals of RTP programs and the essential components of MSIC.</p> <p>Q:Do your school based programs involve the whole school, just a class?</p> <p>A: Some programs reach the entire school, like recess play. Some of the partnered school projects involve a selected group of students.</p> <p>-ICAC is a valuable network for RTP.</p> <p>-We can give youth a voice, work to close the opportunity and achievement gap, and work to reduce the decline of play.</p>
