


On December 6, 2001, the Senate of Canada adopted a motion introduced by the honourable Dr. Senator Poy to federally recognize the month of May as Asian Heritage Month.



In May 2002, the Government of Canada signed an official declaration to designate May as Asian Heritage Month.

Asian Heritage Month is a time to reflect and highlight the important contributions of Asian Canadians to the settlement, growth and development of Canada, the diversity of the Asian community, and its present significance to this country.

Asian Heritage Month in the TDSB

Who is of “Asian” Descent?

The term “Asian” refers to a broad group of people spanning diverse political, economic, social, ethnic, cultural, linguistic, and religious contexts.

The Toronto District School Board and Elementary Teachers Federation of Ontario understand the definition of “Asian” to apply to, but is not limited to, all individuals who come from or whose ancestors came Central Asia, East Asia, South Asia, South East Asia, West Asia.

- Language Spoken: Bangla/Bengali
- Capital City: Dhaka

- Capital City: Amman


Special Facts:

- Petra: An ancient city located in Jordan
- Ruins of the once-great metropolis and trading center now serve as an important archaeological site and tourist attraction.

The Dead Sea:

- The Dead Sea, which is known to be the lowest lying point on earth (408 meters below sea level) is located on the coast of Jordan and is visited by many people around the world.



Spotlight: Kazakhstan

- Population in 2020: 18.75 million
- Language Spoken: Dialects of Kazakh language and Russian
- Capital City: Nur-Sultan

- Apples originated in Kazakhstan as the *Malus Sieversii* which grew in the Tian Shan mountain region.

The space program of Kazakhstan:

- Population in 2020: 32.37 million
- Language Spoken: Malay
- Capital City: Kuala Lumpur

Petronas Towers

- One of Malaysia's and the world's most recognisable landmarks.
- Still hold title of world's tallest twin towers.

Rotating Monarchy

- Malaysia follows a rotating monarchy system
- It's made up of nine ethnic Malay state rulers who take turns becoming king for terms of five-years.



Spotlight: South Korea

- Population in 2020: 52.78 million
- Language Spoken: Korean
- Capital City: Seoul

Special Facts:

K-Pop:

- BTS K-Pop group originated from South Korea and has a global following.
- K-Pop brings in over \$600 million in cultural exports for South Korea.

Taekwondo:

- Taekwondo is one of the oldest forms of martial arts (over 2000 years old) and the art of self defense that originated in **Korea**.





Dr. Joanne Liu - Humanitarian

- Place of birth: Quebec City, Quebec
- Former International President of Doctors without Borders/Medecins Sans Frontieres Organization
- As a daughter of Chinese immigrants, Dr. Liu dreamed of becoming "a doctor without borders" one day.
- In 2014, Liu gave a briefing to the United Nations General Assembly, urging them to mobilize against the Ebola epidemic in West Africa.

Vicky Sunoharo - Athlete

- Place of Birth: Scarborough, Ontario
- Known as the “Wayne Gretzky of women’s hockey”
- Vicky is a two-time Olympic gold medalist serving as an assistant captain for seven years with Team Canada before retiring from international competition in 2008.
- She is the head coach for University of Toronto’s women’s hockey team.
- Vicky is of Japanese and Ukrainian heritage.

Mahmud Jamal - Supreme Court Judge

- Place of birth: Nairobi, Kenya
- Appointed to the Supreme Court of Canada on July 1, 2021.
- Mahmud completed high school in Edmonton, Alberta, and attended the University of Toronto and McGill University.
- Mahmud, of Indian heritage, is the first person of colour appointed to the Supreme Court of Canada.

“Like many others, I experienced discrimination as a fact of daily life. As a child and youth, I was taunted and harassed because of my name, religion or the colour of my skin.”

Simu Liu - Actor

- Place of birth: Harbin China
- Simu Immigrated with his parents to Canada when he was 5 years old and grew up in Mississauga, ON.
- Best known for his role in Marvel's Shang-Chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings (2021).
- He played Jung Kim on the CBC sitcom Kim's Convenience, and is also a writer and producer for TV and films.

"We have a lot of heroes. We have Asian heroes, we have Asian American heroes, men, women, of all ages, and not all of them do martial arts. But that doesn't mean that they don't have their own arcs, their own stories, their own subtleties and nuances. And I think that's what's important."





Lilly Singh - Author, Creator


- Place of birth: Toronto, Ontario

Malala Yousafzai - Activist

- Place of birth: Mingora, Pakistan
- She also wrote the picture book Malala's Magic Pencil, based on her childhood.
- In 2014 Malala and Kailash Satyarthi were jointly awarded the Nobel Prize for Peace in recognition of their efforts on behalf of children's rights
- In 2014 Malala was bestowed an honorary Canadian citizenship.
