A Day in Aviation




The Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement is collaborating with the Black Aviation Professionals Network to produce the *A Day in Aviation* program.

The secondary school cohort is reading *Children of Blood and Bone* by Tomi Adeyemi. The session for secondary school students runs from March 23 to April 21, 2022.

Launched by Graduation Coaches for Black Students, the Black Girls' Book Club is a space to build community, explore new stories and ways of creative expression. The club meets with self-identifying Black girls in the TDSB to celebrate the voices of Black women authors.

Black Students in Business Collective

The Black Students in Business Collective is a partnership between the Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement, Ivey Business School at Western University, Schulich School of Business at York University and Smith School of Business at Queen's University.

On March 10, students participated in a business competition. As part of this competition, students designed a product and presented a business plan, budget, design strategy, marketing strategy and pitch.

In advance of the business competition, sessions were held on February 17 and 24 for Grades 10 students interested in exploring business as a post-secondary pathway. During these sessions, students learned about academic and career opportunities in business, and the breadth of offerings from the three business schools.

Black Student Summer Leadership Program

The Black Student Summer Leadership Program led by the Graduation Coaches for Black Students facilitates the exploration of career fields including, community development, information technology, public health, skilled trades, business, media and creative industries.

Enrolled students are offered paid experiential learning opportunities in the summer, in addition to mentorship and training sessions.

On March 2 and March 3, [pre-employment workshops](#) facilitated in partnership with Tropicana Community Services and the YMCA of Greater Toronto were held.

The pre-employment workshops provided students with knowledge about social media, professionalism, managing a digital footprint and interview skills.

This program is made possible through collaborations with a variety of organizations, where TDSB students are placed with post-secondary institutions, community educators and for-profit and not-for-profit establishments.

ADVANCE Music Discovery Program

The Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement in collaboration with ADVANCE Canada's Black Music Business Collective is running a 9-week program from March to June for Grade 11 and 12 students.

This program connects Black youth with industry executives and professionals in the music business.

Throughout the program, students receive mentorship and support in the development of transferable skills and obtain increased access to professional and academic opportunities.

Enrolled students explore career pathways in the music industry including the roles of a content creator, data analyst, royalty administrator, marketing manager and more.

An information session was held on March 10 and on March 24, students explored opportunities within the realm of concerts and music festivals.

EnVision Conference

The annual [EnVision Conference](#) took place on Tuesday, March 29 and Wednesday, March 30. This year's focus was 2SLGBTQIAP+ Indigenous, Black and racialized collective care and activism. The event featured keynote speakers Tru Wilson, Dr. Andrew B. Campbell and the Toronto Kiki Ballroom Alliance.

The EnVision Conference invited 2SLGBTQIAP+ elementary and secondary students and their allies/co-conspirators to honour and celebrate 2SLGBTQIAP+ communities and issues faced across Ontario in addressing homophobia and transphobia.

Participating students explored ways to celebrate gender and sexual diversity through a variety of live and pre-recorded workshops.
