

Human Library Podcast

The [TDSB Human Library](#) podcast is returning for a second season! The theme for season two is Conversations Around Black Student Success and Excellence.

The Human Library podcast comprises of a collection of audio episodes on topics that challenge educators to critically reflect on their pedagogy. Episodes explore innovative ways educators can centre students, deepen relationships with families and enhance community partnerships. Each episode also offers an inquiry question to support educators in re-envisioning their practice.

Grounded within the mandates of the Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement, the latest season introduces audience members to leading scholars, emerging thinkers, and fellow educators passionate about creating learning spaces dedicated to Black student success, well-being and positive racial identity. Season two highlights strategies that support meaningful engagement and advocacy of caregivers and communities. It also offers guidance with navigating the education system.

The first episode, Loving Blackness: Supporting Positive Racial Identity in the Early Years features Dr. Kerry-Ann Escayg, Associate Professor of Early Childhood Education, University of Nebraska-Omaha. Stay tuned for the launch date.

Black Student Leadership Courses

This fall, the Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement in collaboration with the TDSB's Research and Development Department, the Jean Augustine Chair, Dr. Carl James, and researchers at York University, are offering two courses centering on Black Student Leadership and Youth Participatory Action Research (YPAR).

The course offerings are CPC 301 - Politics in Action: Making Change and HSE4M1: Equity and Social Justice - From Theory to Practice.

This program serves self-identifying Black TDSB students in Gr.11 or 12. The program runs from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. each Saturday from October 23, 2021 to June 18, 2022.

Enrolled students explore topics within government relations, social justice, equity and power relations. Students will also develop skills in research, advocacy and leadership.



Community Consultations

Community members and parents of children enrolled in the TDSB are invited to attend a community consultation.



Sankofa Black Heritage Series Teachers' Guide

The TDSB-Rubicon Sankofa Black Heritage Series Teachers' Guide is now available [online](#). The guide supports the implementation of Black-centred texts & culturally relevant pedagogies in Gr. 4 - 8 literacy classrooms. The resource guide provides 15 step-by-step, literacy-focused learning experiences derived from the texts contained in the Rubicon Sankofa Black Heritage Series.

The Rubicon Sankofa Black Heritage Series centres on the powerful, diverse & complex stories, histories & cultures of Black people. The informational texts in each book of the Rubicon Sankofa Black Heritage Series invites students to focus on and explore the past of African peoples along with examining contemporary communities and cultures.

The use of Black-authored and Black-centred texts in literacy learning experiences are vital for Black and non-racialized students and teachers to deepen their understanding of the incredible and complex histories, stories and cultural legacies of people of African descent.

Anti-racist and anti-oppressive pedagogy that uses culturally relevant and sustaining practices to address issues of power and privilege in classrooms is a successful means to reduce opportunity gaps and to improve educational outcomes of students.

Experiential Learning Program

The Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement in collaboration with Interac Corp. is offering an experiential learning and professional development program for Black students in TDSB schools.

The sessions aim to provide mentorship, develop creativity, foster innovation, enhance entrepreneurial thinking and build technological and transferable skills.

Students enrolled in the program are financially compensated for their efforts. By completing the program students gain skills relevant for today's workforce.

Program launched on November 10 and is open to students from Grades 10 to 12.
