

Weekly Update – January 25, 2015 Items of Interest

Wilson Report and Minister's Directions to the Toronto District School Board

At a Special Board Meeting last Monday, the Board decided:

- (a) That the directions issued by the Minister of Education on January 15, 2015, in response to the Wilson Report: Review of the Toronto District School Board be received;
- (b) That the necessary steps to ensure compliance within the specified timeline be taken, including:
 - (i) That the January 21, 2015 meeting of the Planning and Priorities Committee be moved to January 28, 2015 in order to receive an update from the Director of Education;
 - (ii) That at the regular meeting on February 4, 2015, the Board consider the action plans in response to the Minister's directions;
 - (iii) That a special meeting be scheduled for February 10, 2015 to finalize and approve a response and associated action plans to the Minister of Education;
 - (iv) That a special meeting be held to hear from the public on the issues arising from the Minister's directions, to be chaired by the Chair of the Board, that all delegation rules apply, and that it be the opportunity for delegations on the issue.

Ward Forum Report

We had a great turnout last Thursday at Davisville – we confirmed our FSLAC (Bethany Matheu) and PIAC representatives (Rania Saleh and Ali York) and began the meeting with an update from Superintendent Sandra Tondat who spoke to TDSB Years of Action plan and school improvement plans. She noted improvement achieved through "Learning Walks" with expanded focus from Literacy to Mathematics (beyond mechanics to inquiry) and described the District Process (formerly District Review Process) that continues with the focused review of individual schools over a 5-year cycle. I spoke to the Wilson Report and Ministry Directives and facilitated Qs and As from a very engaged audience. Associate Director Carla





Kisko presented information on the Board's 2015-16 Operating Budget which also generated a great discussion on funding and advocacy – we promised a follow-up session on the Capital Budget before March Break. Culling School Library Books (information from staff) Why we do we cull library books:

- Resources in school libraries need to meet the criteria for selection outlined in PR531 and summarized in guide: *Developing School Library Collections* (found in the Developing School Library Collections: A Community Guide Revised Edition (March 2013).
- Students are more encouraged to read when the library collection contains the best and the most up-to-date materials available. Therefore, the collection should be visibly attractive and in good condition. All materials should be accurate, current, and relevant to the curricular and recreational needs of the students and staff.
- These standards are applied to collection development during both the selection of new materials and the identification of materials for de-selection. In de-selection, further criteria are applied, such as condition, equity, circulation history, and currency.
- Collection development is the professional mandate of qualified teacher-librarians, supported by the Instructional Leaders, who assist teacher-librarians in schools with selection and de-selection procedures. School communities also have expressed an interest in assisting with de-selection, recycling, and reusing the resources."
- The TDSB wants students to have quality learning resources for success. For staff and students, resources need to be accurate, appropriate, and up-to-date. They need to match student interests, curricular needs, and skill levels. Materials are deselected when they are in poor or unhealthy condition, contain inaccurate information, display unacceptable bias, remain uncirculated, or are replaceable with newer".

Process with the school: "Procedures" Whether de-selecting each month, or in a large-scale library staff follow a sequence of steps

Step 1

The teacher-librarian, Library Program Coordinator or Instructional Leader communicates the plan and process with the school principal, who informs the school community regarding the collection updating and deselection process and procedures. Teachers and parents/guardians/caregivers receive this booklet and/or a communiqué/newsletter with relevant sections prior to the process.


Step 2

The library staff then deselects the material into three groups as outlined in Figure 1 (below). This chart shows the path for de-selection and for identifying which resources can be: used in the school, used in other schools; or because of condition or content that does not meet TDSB equity policies are sent for recycling.



Figure 1 outlines the process in the sequence followed by library staff, in conjunction with the school community.

Parents support full-day kindergarten

According to a new study from the Atkinson Centre for Society and Child Development, most parents whose children attended full-day kindergarten (FDK) believe their children benefited socially and academically.

- 85% of parents agree that FDK helped prepare their child socially and academically for school
- Parents were evenly divided as to whether their involvement with their child's learning increased or decreased as a result of FDK
- 75% of parents receiving child care subsidies said that FDK facilitates their ability to work. They also reported that FDK helped to reduce family stress
