Presentation	Giovanna De Girolamo presented part #1 of the Presentation (see link, Presentation slides #7-10):	
Giovanna De Girolamo (Manager – Planning)	 Setting the Context: Long-Term Program and Accommodation Strategy (LTPAS) (Slide #7) The LTPAS advances the system goal to "provide equity of access to learning opportunities for all students". The document – with a 10-year outlook and renewed every year – identifies a number of studies to be undertaken to resolve existing and future accommodation pressures in the city. Flowing from the goals of the LTPAS, a Secondary Program Review has been held, which among other things formulated a Program Priority: To improve equity of access to programs, staff will also undertake a review to determine two locations for new centralized Arts Programs. Setting the Context: Why are we here? (Slide #8) As part of the Secondary Program Review, access to Student Interest Programs in the Arts was identified as a gap to be addressed. There are gaps in the North-West and the North-East part of the city. The Board's LTPAS includes a study to examine opportunities for new Arts-based Student Interest Programs in the northwest and northeast parts of the city. The Goal is to build rich, high-quality Arts-based programs that reflect student voice, and focus less on replicating what exists now in other Arts-based programs. Programs would open students to a variety of experiences in the Arts The intent is that the programs are to be advertised through the 2023-24 school year and opened for September 2024. Local Feasibility Study (Slide #9) Studies in the LTPAS are approved by the Central Accommodation Team (CAT) to commence Local Feasibility Team (LFT) work. The LFT met between June 2022 and March 2023, and was comprised of local Trustees, 	
	Superintendents, Principals, Central TDSB Staff, and other support staff. Site options were reviewed, and Woburn C.I. was determined to be a school that should be explored. Therefore, the LFT recommended the establishment of a Program Area Review.	
	 Program Area Review Process (Slide #10) with the LFT process completed, we are now in the Program Area Review (PART) part of the 	



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	process. PARTs are commenced to consider the establishment of a new school or specialized program. The PART process offers opportunities for consultation and feedback. - Working meetings were held with student and parent representatives to review various options of how the program might take shape. - This is a public meeting to obtain additional feedback, and the board will keep receiving feedback while the program is being finalized. - A final report from the PART will come forward in June, with recommendations to inform staff

Existing Secondary Art Programs: see map (Slide #11) The five currently existing TDSB Arts Programs are at Earl Haig (Claude Watson School for the Arts) to the north; Central Technical School and Rosedale Heights in the south, Etobicoke School of the Arts in the south-western part of the city, and Wexford Collegiate School of the Arts in the south-east. The map (with dots for each student attending an Arts program) shows a lack of arts programs in the north-western and north-eastern parts of the city. 	
	 Enrolment Projection – Woburn C.I. Status Quo: see chart (Slide #12) Current enrolment (as per October 2022) is 982 (64% of 1542 capacity). Status quo enrolment is projected to increase slightly, but Woburn C.I. would remain underutilized. 	
	- Enrolment Projection – Woburn C.I. Scenario (with Arts Program): see chart (Slide #13). With a 2-class (60 students) grade 9 program starting in 2024, the program would be fully phased in by 2027. The scenario shows that the program would lead to a very good utilization of Woburn C.I., while even assuming most or even all students are from out-of-area, the facility has enough capacity to accommodate the program. The utilization would go from 69% in 2024 (+4% compared to Woburn C.I. as is) to 85% in 2028 (full phase-in of the program, +16% compared to the status quo projection).	
	- Site Selection Rationale (Slides #14-15) Potential sites are reviewed through several lenses:	
	Staffing: • Woburn C.I. has the staffing required to support the majority of the areas of the arts. • There is already a strong arts program within the school, with space for growth.	



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Item / Presenter	Access and Equity: • Central to Scarborough and will improve access to priority underserved neighbourhoods. • Work is required to create an accessible area within the auditorium, and a specialized area to support dance (auditorium stage is currently used). • The school does not have an elevator to facilitate access to the second floor, or accessible entrances equipped with power-operated doors. There are accessible washrooms Enrolment and Space: • The school is projected to have sufficient space available over the long-term to support an Arts Program	Attachments / Actions / Results
	Facility: • Facilities aligned with the needs of a future Arts Program • The school also has the specialized classrooms and spaces to support a fulsome Arts Program. Reiko Fuentes (Centrally Assigned Principal – Secondary Program & Admissions	 Staff Recommended Vision for Arts Program (Slide 16-17) Much work has been done with staff and in previous PART meetings to articulate what the program should look like. We are looking to create a unique program at will meet the needs, interests, and demands of the students who are within the area. Guiding Principles (slide #16) Breaking from the traditional Euro-centric Arts Program model – making sure students see themselves in the program. Strong integration of digital media/arts (music, film, production, animation, media arts, photography etc.) – supporting 21s century work. Focus on student generated content and the creative process (not just replication) 	
	Involvement of outside artists and establishing community partnerships. Program Structure (slide #17)	



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	Program comprised of 7 - 12 courses from Grades 9 - 12	7 totions / nesants

	• Drama: Also, a focus on the production side: script writing, directing opportunities. Inclusion of spoken word	
	 Music: in addition to traditional instrumental or performance, consideration of Composition, DJing, Vocal music.

This ensures clear pathways in the arts into future work, future studies, both directly in the arts and the creative industries. • Inquiries about possible additional funding to support arts opportunities (i.e. resource intensive art supplies such as ceramics, digital technology to replace an aging computer lab, visiting artists, arts excursions etc.). • Interest from the broader staff in collaborative projects integrating arts into other curriculum areas. • Staff is continuing to refine their vision with student feedback Data.

That a new Arts-focus Central Student Interest Program be established in the northeast at Woburn CI 2. Admission to the program will be based on interest-based criteria as outlined in the Student Interest Program Policy (P100); 3. That the existing Arts-qualified Teachers support the needs of the Arts program and as it grows, additional staff may be required. 4. That the new Arts program be implemented for Grade 9 in September of 2024, Grade 10 in September of 2025, Grade 11 in September of 2026, and Grade 12 in September of 2027. Answer: In this PART, we are principally speaking about the Arts Program courses for grade 9, but one of the reasons Woburn C.I. was chosen is because of the wide variety of Arts courses already 	



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	offered at all different grade levels. There is already a strong arts presence. As the emphasis of	
	the Arts will grow, it would be expected that more opportunities will be come available.	
	 Q: Will my son, currently in JK, be able to join this program? 	
	A: Absolutely, when he is in grade 8, and interested, he can apply for the program which should then be fully up and running.
